


Outcome Measures

IMMEDIATE (beginning to end of Grade 1):

- Classroom-level Spleems collected by teams of trained, independent observers
- Strengths and Difficulties Questionnaire (SDQ) completed by teachers
- (Early Development Instrument data from Kindergarten as baseline)

INTERMEDIATE AND LONG-TERM (annual: Grade 2 through Grade 12+):

- Grade 3, 7, 8, 9 assessments (language and math) from school divisions
- Use of special education services from Department of Education
- High school graduation from school divisions and Department of Education
- Physical and mental health from Department of Health (and Youth Health Survey)
- Health service utilization (including physician visits, medication use, hospitalization) from Department of
- Addictions (smoking, alcohol, drugs) from Department of Health (and YHS)
- Crime (violent crime, property crime) from Department of Justice

(The Healthy Child Manitoba Act authorizes longitudinal, population-level, person-specific data collection and data linkage across sectors and over time; additional linkage and secondary data analyses through long-term research partnership with Manitoba Centre for Health Policy, University of Manitoba)
